

DENIS McARDLE, a classically trained baritone singer employs unique arrangements of classical and folk songs with Jillian Saunders on solo piano. Jillian Saunders is accompanist to the *Three Tenors in Concert* and performs regularly with her string quartet the *Avalon String Quartet*.





DIANNE MARSHALL has enjoyed a wonderful career to date having performed as a solo, chamber and orchestral musician throughout the world. Dianne gained her B.Mus.(Hons) degree from the Royal Academy of Music in London.

PADDY BUSHE has published nine collections of poetry seven in English and two in Irish as well as three books of translations. The long titled poem "Hopkins on Skellig Michael" (Dedalus 2001) is an exploration of an imagined pilgrimage by Hopkins to the remote island monastery off the Kerry coast.





DR MICHAEL O'DWYER is a graduate of NUI Maynooth, of the Université de Toulouse-Le Mirail, where he completed a Maitrise and of the Université de Paris 111 (Sorbonne Nouvelle) where he obtained his Ph.D. He has written extensively in French and English on Julien Green.

IRENE KYFFIN is of Irish/Jewish descent, moved to London when she was 20. She holds a Degree in Drama and a Masters in Social Anthropology. She now works and gives public lectures in Dyslexia, while writing and performing poetry and writing papers on Hopkins.





PÁDRAIG J. DALY was born in Dungarvan, Co. Waterford and is an Augustinian priest. He has published 11 collections of original poetry and 4 collections of translations from Italian and from Irish. He will read from his latest book, "God in Winter" (Dedalus 2015).

NORMAN WHITE is a world authority on the work of Hopkins. In 1968 he was a joint founder of the Hopkins Society; the following year he founded the Hopkins Research Bulletin; in 1975 he was active in organising the exhibition "The Visual World of Gerard Manley Hopkins", which travelled all over Britain.


